Всероссийской олимпиады школьников по английскому языку

Уважаемый участник Олимпиады!

Олимпиадная работа по английскому языку состоит из четырёх разделов, включающих 41 задание. Вам предстоит выполнить ряд заданий в виде теста с кратким ответом и одно задание с развернутым ответом.

Раздел 1 (Аудирование) включает 5 заданий с выбором одного правильного ответа из трёх предложенных. За каждый правильный ответ за задания 1-5 выставляется один балл. Максимальное количество баллов за выполнение заданий Раздела 1: 5. Рекомендуемое время на выполнение Раздела 1 – 10 минут.

Раздел 2 (Чтение) включает 11 заданий. За каждый правильный ответ за задания 6-16 выставляется один балл. Максимальное количество баллов за выполнение заданий Раздела 2: 11. Рекомендуемое время на выполнение Раздела 2 – 30 минут.

Раздел 3 (Грамматика и лексика) включает 24 задания. За каждый правильный ответ в заданиях 16-40 выставляется один балл. Максимальное количество баллов за выполнение заданий Раздела 3 - 24 балла. Рекомендуемое время на выполнение Раздела 3 – 30 минут.

По окончании выполнения заданий каждого из этих разделов не забывайте переносить свои ответы в Бланк ответов (Answer Sheet).

Раздел 4 (Письмо) состоит из одного задания и представляет собой небольшую письменную работу (написание рассказа по указанной тематике). Рекомендуемое время на выполнение этого раздела работы – 30 минут. Максимальное количество баллов за выполнение заданий Раздела 4 – 10 баллов. Черновые пометки делаются прямо на листе с заданиями (они не оцениваются), и только полный вариант ответа заносится в Бланк ответов (Answer Sheet).

THE TEENAGE FURNITURE DESIGNER

15-year-old Daniella Hudson recently took part in her first design show.

Daniella Hudson grew up in a very creative family. ‘Mum and dad made all our furniture,’ she says. ‘Not because we couldn’t afford it: they just preferred making stuff to buying it. So visits to city furniture shops nearby just weren’t part of my childhood.’ When Daniella visited a design exhibition with her class at the age of ten, she realised she wanted to follow her parents’ example. ‘There were so many different styles of tables and chairs there!’ she says. Since that day, she’s been ‘making furniture. ‘I’ve learnt by giving mum and dad a hand, and through watching videos on the Internet.’

Her first piece was a table, made soon after visiting the exhibition, and similar to one she’d seen there. ‘They had furniture from the last hundred years, and I copied 1920s design,’ comments Daniella. ‘Unfortunately, no one has wanted tables like that for years. I was pleased with the quality of my work, though. I’ve painted it recently because the wood I chose originally was too dark’.

Daniella started selling her furniture at a local market. ‘I spend most of my free time inside so this gave me the chance to get some fresh air and find out what people thought about my designs.’ Judging by how many items Daniella sold, they thought it was pretty good. ‘Eventually, I had to give up,’ says Daniella. ‘I’d also started an Internet business, which was doing so well it was taking up every spare minute I had. The market closed down just after that anyway.

Recently, Daniella was asked to take part in a local design show. ‘One of the organisers had bought one of my pieces off the Internet. I couldn’t believe it when she told me there’d be a thousand visitors,’ she comments. Rather than worrying about this, Daniella was excited by the opportunity. ‘I was amazed she thought my ‘work was good enough,’ Daniella says. I had little idea what visitors would think about it. My furniture is quite different from the designers whose work I’ve seen in magazines – mine is more traditional’ But Daniella received lots of orders at the show and the future is looking bright for this young design star.

PARENTS ARE HUMANS TOO!

Talking to parents, can be difficult, but a little understanding on both sides can make it easier.

Do you ever get the feeling that your parents just don't listen to you? They'd rather discuss how much you're studying and how long you've been playing computer games this evening than helping you book tickets to see your favourite band. It's not that your parents ignore you completely; it's more that they don't see things in quite the same way as you. When you talk to them, they may give the impression that they're taking in what you say. (11)_____ It's as if the words are going in, but the meaning just isn't getting through to them. And this isn't the only problem you may face.

As you grow up, your personality is developing and you're trying to become more independent, so naturally you have more questions and opinions about all aspects of your life. You start wondering whether your parents actually know what they're talking about. (12)_____ That's often because it's the first time they've been responsible for a teenager and they're learning to cope!

Obviously, it's important to respect your parents and you should try to understand why they might have a different point of view from yours. Their priority

is to provide you with a structured environment, where they can guide and support you. It's crucial for them to know what you're doing and that you're safe. However, it's vital that they try and see your point of view. (13)_____ After all, in only a few years you'll probably leave home and have to look after yourself!

Although this situation is absolutely normal, it doesn't make it any easier. Ideally, your home should be a place where things can be discussed reasonably and constructively. However, parents are human too and can be hurt by what you say to them. Try to remember that in every family there are good times and bad times, but your parents are there for you throughout. (14)_____ You'll be taking steps to earn their trust, and they might be prepared to be more tolerant.

Be sensitive! If there is something you really have to talk about, don't bring it up just before your Mum or Dad goes to work or just before bedtime. Think about what you are going to say and during the discussion, keep calm and be open and honest. Avoid talking about how your friends' parents behave in similar situations. (15)_____ Reminding yourself that many other teenagers are having the same problems can, however, offer the best way of coping with such feelings.

The important thing is to keep talking. (16)_____ Remember that there's no reason why people should automatically understand all your views. The more you can discuss things with your parents in a mature way, the happier you will feel. On the other hand, if you really find it impossible to talk to your parents, it might be a good idea to find a family member, teacher or professional counsellor who can help you. Above all, stay positive and remember that it won't be long before you'll be able to make your own decisions.
